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Independent Auditors' Report

To the School Board of Lake Country School District

Report on the Financial Statements

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the governmental activities, each major fund and the aggregate remaining fund information of the Lake Country School District, Wisconsin, as of and for the year ended June 30, 2021, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise the Lake Country School District's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; this includes the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditors' Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express opinions on these financial statements based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditors' judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control over financial reporting relevant to the Lake Country School District's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Lake Country School District's internal control. Accordingly, we express no such opinion. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinions.

Opinions

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the respective financial position of the governmental activities, each major fund and the aggregate remaining fund information of the Lake Country School District, Wisconsin, as of June 30, 2021 and the respective changes in financial position thereof for the year then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Other Matters

Required Supplementary Information

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require that the required supplementary information as listed in the table of contents be presented to supplement the basic financial statements. Such information, although not a part of the basic financial statements, is required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board who considers it to be an essential part of financial reporting for placing the basic financial statements in an appropriate operational, economic, or historical context. We have applied certain limited procedures to the required supplementary information in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, which consisted of inquiries of management about the methods of preparing the information and comparing the information for consistency with management's responses to our inquiries, the basic financial statements, and other knowledge we obtained during our audit of the basic financial statements. We do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on the information because the limited procedures do not provide us with sufficient evidence to express an opinion or provide any assurance.

Supplementary Information

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming opinions on the financial statements that collectively comprise the Lake Country School District's basic financial statements. The supplementary information and the schedule of expenditures of federal and state awards as listed in the table of contents are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the basic financial statements. Such information is the responsibility of management and was derived from and relates directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements. The information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements or to the basic financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, the supplementary information and the schedule of expenditures of federal and state awards are fairly stated in all material respects, in relation to the basic financial statements as a whole.

Other Reporting Required by Government Auditing Standards

In accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, we have also issued our report dated December 2, 2021 on our consideration of the Lake Country School District's internal control over financial reporting and on our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements and other matters. The purpose of that report is solely to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the effectiveness of the Lake Country School District's internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* in considering the Lake Country School District's internal control over financial reporting and compliance.

MANAGEMENT'S DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS For the Year Ended June 30, 2021 (unaudited)

The discussion and analysis of the Lake Country School District financial performance provides an overall review of financial activities for the fiscal year and focuses on school district financial performance. The 2020-2021 comparison to the prior year has been presented.

FINANCIAL HIGHLIGHTS

- The District's overall financial status, as reflected in total net position, increased by \$203,597.
- The General Fund (Fund 10) balance decreased from \$897,450 to \$874,611. The fund balance is 16% of actual 2020-2021 Fund 10 expenditures.
- The District issued no new debt in 2020-2021.
- District enrollment, which is a major variable in the District's revenue limit calculation, stayed about the same as 2019-2020. Enrollment in 2020-2021 was 503.
- Total revenues for Governmental Funds were \$6,565,194. This amount includes \$4,000,416 of local property taxes and \$32,799 of general state aid. Property taxes represent 61% of all revenue, all funds. General state aid represents less than % of all revenue, all funds.

OVERVIEW OF THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

This annual financial report consists of two parts—management's discussion and analysis and the basic financial statements (district-wide and fund statements) including notes to the financial statements.

The basic financial statements consist of two kinds of statements that present different views of the District's financial activities.

- The <u>Statement of Net Position</u> and <u>Statement of Activities</u> provide information on a district-wide basis. These
 statements present an aggregate view of the District's finances. District-wide statements contain useful longterm information as well as information for the just-completed year presented in a manner like private-sector
 businesses.
 - The <u>Statement of Net Position</u> compares assets/deferred outflows to liabilities/deferred inflows to give an overall view of the financial health of the District. Over time, increases or decreases in net position may serve as a useful indicator of whether the financial position of the District is improving or deteriorating.
 - The <u>Statement of Activities</u> defines the District's expenses by function and illustrates the total that is offset by corresponding revenues charges for services and/or operating grants and contributions. General revenues and extraordinary credits are identified. The result is total net expense offset by general and miscellaneous revenue recognizing the Change in Net position for the District from the previous year.

- 2. The remaining statements: <u>Balance Sheet Governmental Funds</u> and <u>Statement of Revenues</u>, <u>Expenditures and Changes in Fund Balances –Governmental Funds</u> focus on individual parts of the District. Fund statements generally report operations in more detail than the district-wide statements and support the <u>Statement of Net position</u>.
 - The <u>Notes to the Financial Statements</u> provide further explanation of some of the information in the statements and provide additional disclosures so statement users have a complete picture of the District's financial activities and position.
 - <u>Required Supplementary Information</u> further explains and supports the financial statements by including a comparison of the District's budget data for the year and includes all reports in the financial statements including the financial notes.
 - <u>Additional Supplemental Information</u> provides information specific to non-major governmental funds such as the Food Service Fund.
 - The major features of the District's financial statements, including the portion of the activities reported and type of information contained is shown in the following table (Table #1).

District-Wide Statements

The district-wide statements report information about the District using accounting methods like those used by private-sector companies. The statement of net position includes all the District's assets/deferred outflows and liabilities/deferred inflows. All the current year's revenues and expenses are accounted for in the statement of activities regardless of when cash is received or paid.

The two district-wide statements report the District's *net position* and how they have changed. Net position—the difference between the District's assets, deferred outflows, deferred inflows and liabilities – is one way to measure the District's financial health or *position*.

Statement of Net position: (Table 2)

Table 2 provides a summary of the District's net position for the year ended June 30, 2021 compared to the year ended June 30, 2020. As of June 30, 2021, the District reported total assets of \$9,919,623 and total liabilities of \$3,259,754. Total net position in 2020-2021 was \$6,037,021. This includes the estimated historical cost of sites, site improvements, buildings, building improvements, furniture and equipment net of accumulated depreciation. For fiscal year 2019-2020, the total net position of the District is reported at \$5,833,424 this represents an increase of \$203,597 from fiscal year 2019-2020.

Revenues:

- The District received \$6,565,194 in revenue for the 2020-2021 fiscal year. Sixty one percent (61%) of the District's total revenue came from local school property tax. Less than one percent (1%) of the total came from State Aid. The District receives approximately thirty eight percent (38%) in the form of specific use State Grants, Federal Aid, and direct fees for services. The overall make-up of the sources of revenue did not vary significantly from the previous fiscal year except for donation of funds we were fortunate to receive from the P.T.O. and LCS Foundation to offset technology, ACE, and other costs.
- Individuals and school districts that directly participated or benefited from a program contributed \$1,338,706 of the cost. Book and activity fees, admissions to athletic events, open enrollment tuition, Special Education Aid payments, lunch revenues and building rental fees are included as charges for services.
- Federal and State governments subsidized certain programs with grants and contributions of \$1,046,131.
- General Revenues in the form of property taxes accounted for \$4,000,416 and general state aid for \$32,799.

Expenses

• The District's total expenditure amount was \$6,361,597 for fiscal year 2020-2021. Sixty-seven percent (67%) is directed to pupil instruction and instructional services. Costs for teacher salaries/benefits, textbooks, and instructional supplies are examples of pupil instruction and instructional services

General Fund Budgetary Comparison:

The District adopts an interim budget in April for the subsequent year. Consistent with current state statutes and regulations, the original budget is amended in October to reflect the actual revenue cap and state aid certification. The budget was amended after October by action of the School Board.

Fund Balances:

- The District shows a total for all fund balances of \$933,504 as of June 30, 2021.
- \$874,611 is in the General Fund. The District utilizes this fund balance for funding short-term operations as well as future retirement liabilities. The interest earned on investment of these funds provides additional spending capacity. The General Fund balance is 16% of operating expenditures. A fund balance of this size is a positive sign of financial viability, enhances the District's bond ratings, and allows the District to respond to non-recurring economic needs.
- The remaining fund balance includes \$474 for Special Revenue Trust Fund revenues to be spent and other district donations. There is also \$58,419 in Food Service which will be used to upgrade capital

Governmental Activities:

The District's current financial position can be credited to effective and conservative fiscal management. It has been the goal of the Board of Education to implement ongoing capital improvement projects in all the buildings of the District. A list of capital improvement projects is reviewed by administration and the Board every fiscal period to insure the physical plants in the District are kept in good condition and that costly major repairs may be averted through timely facility maintenance.

- Each year, detailed attention is paid to staffing levels. Class size levels are watched closely to ensure high quality education levels and at the same time develop a budget within the constraints of the state-imposed revenue limit.
- The district keeps a close watch on enrollment projections and plans personnel transactions accordingly. Enrollment is projected to stay about the same from 2020-2021 to 2021-2022.

Capital Asset Administration

Capital Assets

• We are currently complying with the requirements of GASB 34. The District capitalizes assets with a value greater than \$5,000 and a useful life greater than 5 years. Depreciation is computed based on a straight-line basis over the life of the asset. Information on capital asset balances and current year activity is reported on page 25.

District's Future

- The state budget has given the board the tools needed to help offset the loss in per pupil funds for the next two years. These tools help the board control costs for the future of the district. The state has allowed a small amount per pupil over the next two years which will help. The new biannual budget will always be a factor in our funding and we pay close attention to those changes.
- One of the most important variables in the District's financial future is the cost of health insurance for its employees. The cost of health benefits for all District employees is increasing at approximately 10 % per year. If these rate increases continue, the cost of health benefits will have an impact on the instructional services of the District. Administration has been implementing various employee cost saving and sharing measures to offset the District's portion of this expense, but this issue continues to be a budgetary challenge. Administration is also working to decrease and or eliminate our OPEB benefits in the future as that plays a major factor in our expenses and budget each year.
- It is important that the District continues to be able to complete capital improvement projects. It is one of the Board of Education's goals and a budget priority to continue to upgrade and maintain the physical plants of the District.

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Notes to Financial Statements June 30, 2021

1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The accounting policies of the Lake Country School District, Wisconsin (the District) conform to accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America as applicable to governmental units. The accepted standard-setting body for establishing governmental accounting and financial reporting principles is the Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB).

Reporting Entity

This report includes all of the funds of the District. The reporting entity for the District consists of the primary government and its component units. Component units are legally separate organizations for which the primary government is financially accountable or other organizations for which the nature and significance of their relationship with the primary government are such that their exclusion would cause the reporting entity's financial statements to be misleading. The District has not identified any organizations that meet this criteria.

District-Wide and Fund Financial Statements

District-Wide Financial Statements

The statement of net position and statement of activities display information about the reporting government as a whole. They include all funds of the reporting entity. Governmental activities generally are financed through taxes, intergovernmental revenues and other nonexchange revenues. Likewise, the primary government is reported separately from certain legally separate component units for which the primary government is financially accountable.

The statement of activities demonstrates the degree to which the direct expenses of a given function or segment are offset by program revenues. Direct expenses are those that are clearly identifiable with a specific function or segment. The District does not allocate indirect expenses to functions in the statement of activities. Program revenues include 1) charges to customers or applicants who purchase, use or directly benefit from goods, services or privileges provided by a given function or segment, and 2) grants and contributions that are restricted to meeting the operational or capital requirements of a particular function or segment. Taxes and other items not included among program revenues are reported as general revenues. Internally dedicated resources are reported as general revenues rather than as program revenues.

Fund Financial Statements

Financial statements of the District are organized into funds, each of which is considered to be a separate accounting entity. Each fund is accounted for by providing a separate set of self-balancing accounts, which constitute its assets, deferred outflows of resources, liabilities, deferred inflows of resources, net position/fund balance, revenues and expenditures/expenses.

Funds are organized as major funds or nonmajor funds within the governmental statements. An emphasis is placed on major funds within the governmental category. A fund is considered major if it is the primary operating fund of the District or meets the following criteria:

- a. Total assets/deferred outflows of resources, liabilities/deferred inflows of resources, revenues or expenditures/expenses of that individual governmental fund are at least 10 percent of the corresponding total for all funds of that category or type, and
- b. In addition, any other governmental fund that the District believes is particularly important to financial statement users may be reported as a major fund.

Separate financial statements are provided for governmental funds. Major individual governmental funds are reported as separate columns in the fund financial statements.

Notes to Financial Statements June 30, 2021

The District reports the following major governmental funds:

General Fund

General Fund accounts for the District's primary operating activities. It is used to account for and report all financial resources except those accounted for and reported in another fund.

Special Revenue Funds

Special Education Fund - Special Revenue Fund is used to account for and report grants and local revenues, that are restricted or committed to provide special education services to district students.

The District reports the following nonmajor governmental funds:

Special Revenue Funds

Special Revenue Funds are used to account for and report the proceeds of specific revenue sources that are restricted or committed to expenditures for specified purposes (other than debt service or capital projects).

Gift Trust Fund (Contributions)
Food Service Fund (Food service grants and fees)
Community Service Fund (Local taxes and fees)
Cooperative Program Fund (Cooperative education program)

Measurement Focus, Basis of Accounting and Financial Statement Presentation

District-Wide Financial Statements

The district-wide statement of net position and statement of activities are reported using the economic resources measurement focus and the accrual basis of accounting. Under the accrual basis of accounting, revenues are recognized when earned and expenses are recorded when the liability is incurred or economic asset used. Revenues, expenses, gains, losses, assets and liabilities resulting from exchange and exchange-like transactions are recognized when the exchange takes place. Property taxes are recognized as revenues in the year for which they are levied. Grants and similar items are recognized as revenue as soon as all eligibility requirements imposed by the provider are met. Unbilled receivables are recorded as revenues when services are provided.

As a general rule, the effect of interfund activity has been eliminated from the district-wide financial statements.

Fund Financial Statements

Governmental fund financial statements are reported using the current financial resources measurement focus and the modified accrual basis of accounting. Revenues are recorded when they are both measurable and available. Available means collectible within the current period or soon enough thereafter to be used to pay liabilities of the current period. For this purpose, the District considers revenues to be available if they are collected within 60 days of the end of the current fiscal period. Expenditures are recorded when the related fund liability is incurred, except for unmatured interest on long-term debt, claims, judgments, compensated absences and pension expenditures, which are recorded as a fund liability when expected to be paid with expendable available financial resources.

Property taxes are recorded in the year levied as receivables and revenue.

Notes to Financial Statements June 30, 2021

Intergovernmental aids and grants are recognized as revenues in the period the District is entitled the resources and the amounts are available. Amounts owed to the District which are not available are recorded as receivables and unavailable revenues. Amounts received before eligibility requirements (excluding time requirements) are met are recorded as liabilities. Amounts received in advance of meeting time requirements are recorded as deferred inflows.

Revenues susceptible to accrual include property taxes, miscellaneous taxes, public charges for services, and interest. Other general revenues such as student fees, recreation fees, and miscellaneous revenues are recognized when received in cash or when measurable and available under the criteria described above. Charges for special education services are not reduced by anticipated state special education aid entitlement.

All Financial Statements

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets, deferred outflows of resources, liabilities and deferred inflows of resources and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenditures/expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Assets, Deferred Outflows of Resources, Liabilities, Deferred Inflows of Resources, and Net Position or Equity

Deposits and Investments

Investment of District funds is restricted by Wisconsin state statutes. Available investments are limited to:

- a. Time deposits in any credit union, bank, savings bank or trust company.
- b. Bonds or securities of any county, city, drainage district, technical college district, village, town or school district of the state. Also, bonds issued by a local exposition district, a local professional baseball park district, a local professional football stadium district, a local cultural arts district, the University of Wisconsin Hospitals and Clinics Authority or the Wisconsin Aerospace Authority.
- c. Bonds or securities issued or guaranteed by the federal government.
- d. The local government investment pool.
- e. Any security maturing in seven years or less and having the highest or second highest rating category of a nationally recognized rating agency.
- f. Securities of an open-end management investment company or investment trust, subject to various conditions and investment options.
- g. Repurchase agreements with public depositories, with certain conditions.

The District has adopted an investment policy. That policy has approved public depositories and follows the state statute for allowable investments. The District has an investment policy that requires deposits to be limited to amounts that are protected by state and federal laws and the District complied with this provision of the policy as described in Note III A.

No policy exists for the following risks:

Credit risk

Notes to Financial Statements June 30, 2021

Investments are stated at fair value, which is the amount at which an investment could be exchanged in a current transaction between willing parties. No investments are reported at amortized cost. Adjustments necessary to record investments at fair value are recorded in the operating statement as increases or decreases in investment income. Investment income on commingled investments of municipal accounting funds is allocated based on average balances. The difference between the bank statement balance and carrying value is due to outstanding checks and/or deposits in transit.

The Wisconsin Local Government Investment Pool (LGIP) is part of the State Investment Fund (SIF) and is managed by the State of Wisconsin Investment Board. The SIF is not registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission, but operates under the statutory authority of Wisconsin Chapter 25. The SIF reports the fair value of its underlying assets annually. Participants in the LGIP have the right to withdraw their funds in total on one day's notice. At June 30, 2021, the fair value of the District 's share of the LGIP's assets was substantially equal to the amount as reported in these statements.

See Note 3. for further information.

Receivables

General accounts receivable have been adjusted for all known uncollectible accounts. No allowance is necessary at year end.

Property taxes are levied in December on the assessed values as of the prior January 1.

The aggregate amount of property taxes to be levied for school purposes is determined according to the provisions of Chapter 120 of the Wisconsin Statutes. Property taxes levied by the District are certified to local taxing districts for collection. Property taxes attach as an enforceable item as of January 1.

Property taxes are recognized in the fiscal year levied. The District considers all taxes as due prior to the end of the fiscal year. Full receipt of the entire levy is assured within 60 days of the District's fiscal year end.

Property taxes are collected by the local taxing units until January 31. Real estate tax collections after that date are made by the applicable county, which assumes all responsibility for delinquent real estate taxes.

During the course of operations, transactions occur between individual funds that may result in amounts owed between funds. Short-term interfund loans are reported as "due to and from other funds." Long-term interfund loans (noncurrent portion) are reported as "advances from and to other funds." Interfund receivables and payables between funds within governmental activities are eliminated in the statement of net position.

Restricted Assets

Mandatory segregations of assets are presented as restricted assets. Such segregations are required by bond agreements and other external parties.

Notes to Financial Statements June 30, 2021

Capital Assets

Government-Wide Statements

Capital assets, which include property, plant and equipment, are reported in the government-wide financial statements. Capital assets are defined by the government as assets with an initial cost of more than \$5,000 and an estimated useful life in excess of one year. All capital assets are valued at historical cost or estimated historical cost if actual amounts are unavailable. Donated capital assets are recorded at their estimated acquisition value at the date of donation.

Depreciation of all exhaustible capital assets is recorded as an allocated expense in the statement of activities, with accumulated depreciation reflected in the statement of net position. Depreciation is provided over the assets' estimated useful lives using the straight-line method. The range of estimated useful lives by type of asset is as follows:

Buildings and Improvements 60 Years Equipment 5-20 Years

Fund Financial Statements

In the fund financial statements, capital assets used in governmental fund operations are accounted for as capital outlay expenditures of the governmental fund upon acquisition.

Deferred Outflows of Resources

A deferred outflow of resources represents a consumption of net position/fund balance that applies to a future period and will not be recognized as an outflow of resources (expense/expenditure) until that future time.

Compensated Absences

The District's policy does not allow accumulated vacation and sick pay benefits to vest. Unused accumulated vacation and sick pay benefits are forfeited upon retirement or termination of employment. These benefits are recorded as an expenditure in the year used. No accumulated amount is recorded as a liability in the district-wide financial statements.

Long-Term Obligations

All long-term obligations to be repaid from governmental and business-type resources are reported as liabilities in the government-wide statements. The long-term obligations consist primarily of notes and bonds payable and accrued compensated absences.

Long-term obligations for governmental funds are not reported as liabilities in the fund financial statements. The face value of debts (plus any premiums) are reported as other financing sources and payments of principal and interest are reported as expenditures.

Deferred Inflows of Resources

A deferred inflow of resources represents an acquisition of net position/fund balance that applies to a future period and therefore will not be recognized as an inflow of resources (revenue) until that future time.

Notes to Financial Statements June 30, 2021

Equity Classifications

Government-Wide Statements

Equity is classified as net position and displayed in three components:

- a. Net investment in capital assets Consists of capital assets including restricted capital assets, net of accumulated depreciation and reduced by the outstanding balances (excluding unspent debt proceeds) of any bonds, mortgages, notes or other borrowings that are attributable to the acquisition, construction or improvement of those assets.
- b. Restricted net position Consists of net position with constraints placed on their use either by 1) external groups such as creditors, grantors, contributors or laws or regulations of other governments or, 2) law through constitutional provisions or enabling legislation.
- c. *Unrestricted net position* All other net positions that do not meet the definitions of "restricted" or "net investment in capital assets."

When both restricted and unrestricted resources are available for use, it is the District's policy to use restricted resources first, then unrestricted resources as they are needed.

Fund Statements

Governmental fund balances are displayed as follows:

- a. Nonspendable Includes fund balance amounts that cannot be spent either because they are not in spendable form or because legal or contractual requirements require them to be maintained intact.
- b. Restricted Consists of fund balances with constraints placed on their use either by 1) external groups such as creditors, grantors, contributors or laws or regulations of other governments or 2) law through constitutional provisions or enabling legislation.
- c. Committed Includes fund balance amounts that are constrained for specific purposes that are internally imposed by the government through formal action of the highest level of decision making authority. Fund balance amounts are committed through a formal action (resolution) of the District Board. This formal action must occur prior to the end of the reporting period, but the amount of the commitment, which will be subject to the constraints, may be determined in the subsequent period. Any changes to the constraints imposed require the same formal action of the District Board that originally created the commitment.
- d. Assigned Includes spendable fund balance amounts that are intended to be used for specific purposes that do not meet the criteria to be classified as restricted or committed. The district has adopted a financial policy authorizing the administrator and/or bookkeeper to assign amounts for a specific purpose. Assignments may take place after the end of the reporting period.
- e. Unassigned Includes residual positive fund balance within the general fund which has not been classified within the other above mentioned categories. Unassigned fund balance may also include negative balances for any governmental fund if expenditures exceed amounts restricted, committed or assigned for those purposes.

Notes to Financial Statements June 30, 2021

The District considers restricted amounts to be spent first when both restricted and unrestricted fund balance is available unless there are legal documents / contracts that prohibit doing this, such as in grant agreements requiring dollar for dollar spending. Additionally, the District would first use committed, then assigned and lastly unassigned amounts of unrestricted fund balance when expenditures are made.

See Note 3, for further information.

Pension

For purposes of measuring the net pension asset (liability), deferred outflows of resources and deferred inflows of resources related to pensions and pension expense, information about the fiduciary net position of the Wisconsin Retirement System (WRS) and additions to/deductions from WRS' fiduciary net position have been determined on the same basis as they are reported by WRS. For this purpose, benefit payments (including refunds of employee contributions) are recognized when due and payable in accordance with the benefit terms. Investments are reported at fair value.

For purposes of measuring the single-employer pension liability, deferred outflows of resources and deferred inflows of resources related to pensions and pension expenses, the District's single-employer pension plan recognizes benefit payments when due and payable in accordance with the benefit terms

2. Stewardship, Compliance and Accountability

Budgetary Information

Budgetary information is derived from the annual operating budget and is presented using the same basis of accounting for each fund as described in Note 1.

The budgeted amounts presented include any amendments made. The District may authorize transfers of budgeted amounts within departments. Transfers between departments and changes to the overall budget must be approved by a two-thirds council action.

Appropriations lapse at year end unless specifically carried over. There were no carryovers to the following year. Budgets are adopted at the department level of expenditure.

Limitations on the District's Revenues

Wisconsin statutes limit the amount of revenues that school districts may derive from general school aids and property taxes. The annual revenue increase from these sources is limited to an allowable per member increase that is determined by the legislature.

The limitation does not apply to revenues needed for the payment of any general obligation debt service (including refinanced debt) authorized by either of the following:

A resolution of the school board or by a referendum prior to August 12, 1993.

A referendum on or after August 12, 1993.

Deposits in each local and area bank are insured by the FDIC in the amount of \$250,000 for time and savings accounts (including NOW accounts) and \$250,000 for demand deposit accounts (interest-bearing and noninterest-bearing). In addition, if deposits are held in an institution outside of the state in which the government is located, insured amounts are further limited to a total of \$250,000 for the combined amount of all deposit accounts.

Bank accounts are also insured by the State Deposit Guarantee Fund in the amount of \$400,000. However, due to the nature of this fund, recovery of material principal losses may not be significant to individual municipalities. This coverage has not been considered in computing custodial credit risk.

The District maintains collateral agreements with its banks. At June 30, 2021, the banks had pledged various government securities in the amount of \$1,098,003 to secure the District's deposits.

Custodial Credit Risk

Deposits

Custodial credit risk is the risk that in the event of a financial institution failure, the District's deposits may not be returned to the District.

The District does not have any deposits exposed to custodial credit risk.

Credit Risk

Credit risk is the risk that an issuer or other counterparty to an investment will not fulfill its obligations.

The District had investments in the external Wisconsin Local Government Investment Pool which is not rated.

Generally, transfers are used to (1) move revenues from the fund that collects them to the fund that the budget requires to expend them, (2) move receipts restricted to debt service from the funds collecting the receipts to the debt service fund and (3) use unrestricted revenues collected in the general fund to finance various programs accounted for in other funds in accordance with budgetary authorizations.

The above transfer to the special education fund uses unrestricted revenues collected in one fund to finance various programs accounted for in other funds in accordance with budgetary authorizations and Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction directives.

4. Other Information

Employees' Retirement System

Plan Description

The WRS is a cost-sharing multiple-employer defined benefit pension plan. WRS benefits and other plan provisions are established by Chapter 40 of the Wisconsin Statutes. Benefit terms may only be modified by the legislature. The retirement system is administered by the Wisconsin Department of Employee Trust Funds (ETF). The system provides coverage to all eligible State of Wisconsin, local government and other public employees. All employees, initially employed by a participating WRS employer on or after July 1, 2011 expected to work at least 1,200 hours a year (880 hours for teachers and school district educational support employees) and expected to be employed for at least one year from employee's date of hire are eligible to participate in the WRS.

ETF issues a standalone Annual Comprehensive Financial Report (ACFR), which can be found at https://etf.wi.gov/about-etf/reports-and-studies/financial-reports-and-statements.

Vesting

For employees beginning participation on or after January 1, 1990, and no longer actively employed on or after April 24, 1998, creditable service in each of five years is required for eligibility for a retirement annuity. Participants employed prior to 1990 and on or after April 24, 1998, and prior to July 1, 2011, are immediately vested. Participants who initially became WRS eligible on or after July 1, 2011, must have five years of creditable service to be vested.

Benefits Provided

Employees who retire at or after age 65 (54 for protective occupation employees, 62 for elected officials and executive service retirement participants, if hired on or before 12/31/2016) are entitled to retirement benefit based on a formula factor, their average earnings and creditable service.

Final average earnings is the average of the participant's three highest annual earnings period. Creditable service includes current service and prior service for which a participant received earnings and made contributions as required. Creditable service also includes creditable military service. The retirement benefit will be calculated as a money purchase benefit based on the employee's contributions plus matching employer's contributions, with interest, if that benefit is higher than the formula benefit.

Vested participants may retire at age 55 (50 for protective occupations) and receive an actuarially reduced benefit. Participants terminating covered employment prior to eligibility for an annuity may either receive employee-required contributions plus interest as a separation benefit or leave contributions on deposit and defer application until eligible to receive a retirement benefit.

The WRS also provides death and disability benefits for employees.

Post-Retirement Adjustments

The Employee Trust Funds Board may periodically adjust annuity payments from the retirement system based on annual investment performance in accordance with s. 40.27, Wis. Stat. An increase (or decrease) in annuity payments may result when investment gains (losses), together with other actuarial experience factors, create a surplus (shortfall) in the reserves, as determined by the system's consulting actuary. Annuity increases are not based on cost of living or other similar factors. For Core annuities, decreases may be applied only to previously granted increases. By law, Core annuities cannot be reduced to an amount below the original, guaranteed amount (the "floor") set at retirement. Contributions

Required contributions are determined by an annual actuarial valuation in accordance with Chapter 40 of the Wisconsin Statutes. The employee required contribution is one-half of the actuarially determined contribution rate for General category employees, including Teachers, Executives and Elected Officials. Starting on January 1, 2016, the Executives and Elected Officials category merged into the General Employee category. Required contributions for protective employees are the same rate as general employees. Employers are required to contribute the remainder of the actuarially determined contribution rate. The employer may not pay the employee required contribution unless provided for by an existing collective bargaining agreement.

During the reporting period, the WRS recognized \$222,201 in contributions from the District.

Pension Asset, Pension Expense, Deferred Outflows of Resources and Deferred Inflows of Resources Related to Pensions

At June 30, 2021, the District reported an asset of \$1,235,174 for its proportionate share of the net pension asset. The net pension asset was measured as of December 31, 2020, and the total pension liability used to calculate the net pension asset was determined by an actuarial valuation as of December 31, 2019 rolled forward to December 31, 2020. No material changes in assumptions or benefit terms occurred between the actuarial valuation date and the measurement date. The District's proportion of the net pension asset was based on the District's share of contributions to the pension plan relative to the contributions of all participating employers. At December 31, 2020, the District's proportion was 0.01978451 percent, which was a decrease of 0.00023866 percent from its proportion measured as of December 31, 2019.

For the year ended June 30, 2021, the District recognized pension expense of \$145,558.

Long-Term Expected Return on Plan Assets

The long-term expected rate of return on pension plan investments was determined using a building-block method in which best-estimate ranges of expected future real rates of return (expected returns, net of pension plan investment expense and inflation) are developed for each major asset class. These ranges are combined to produce the long-term expected rate of return by weighting the expected future real rates of return by the target asset allocation percentage and by adding expected inflation. Single Discount Rate

A single discount rate of 7.00 percent was used to measure the total pension liability for the current and prior year. This single discount rate was based on the expected rate of return on pension plan investments of 7.00 percent and a long term bond rate of 2.00 percent. (Source: Fixed-income municipal bonds with 20 years to maturity that include only federally tax-exempt municipal bonds as reported in Fidelity Index's "20-year Municipal GO AA Index" as of December 31, 2020. In describing this index, Fidelity notes that the Municipal Curves are constructed using optionadjusted analytics of a diverse population of over 10,000 tax-exempt securities.) Because of the unique structure of WRS, the 7.00 percent expected rate of return implies that a dividend of approximately 1.9 percent will always be paid. For purposes of the single discount rate, it was assumed that the dividend would always be paid. The projection of cash flows used to determine this single discount rate assumed that plan member contributions will be made at the current contribution rate and that employer contributions will be made at rates equal to the difference between actuarially determined contribution rates and the member rate. Based on these assumptions, the pension plan's fiduciary net position was projected to be available to make all projected future benefit payments (including expected dividends) of current plan members. Therefore, the long term expected rate of return on pension plan investments was applied to all periods of projected benefit payments to determine the total pension liability.

At June 30, 2021, the District reported a payable to the pension plan of \$78,860, which represents contractually required contributions outstanding as of the end of the year.

Risk Management

The District is exposed to various risks of loss related to torts; theft of, damage to or destruction of assets; errors and omissions; workers compensation; and health care of its employees. The District purchases commercial insurance to provide coverage for losses from torts; theft of, damage to, or destruction of assets; errors and omission; workers compensation; and health care of its employees. However, other risks, such as torts; theft of, damage to, or destruction of assets; errors and omission; workers compensation; and health care of its employees are accounted for and financed by the District in the general fund.

Commitments and Contingencies

Claims and judgments are recorded as liabilities if all the conditions of Governmental Accounting Standards Board pronouncements are met. The liability band expenditure for claims and judgments are only reported in governmental funds if it has matured. Claims and judgments are recorded in the government-wide statements and proprietary funds as expenses when the related liabilities are incurred.

From time to time, the District is party to various pending claims and legal proceedings. Although the outcome of such matters cannot be forecasted with certainty, it is the opinion of management and the District attorney that the likelihood is remote that any such claims or proceedings will have a material adverse effect on the District's financial position or results of operations.

The District has received federal and state grants for specific purposes that are subject to review and audit by the grantor agencies. Such audits could lead to requests for reimbursements to the grantor agency for expenditures disallowed under terms of the grants. Management believes such disallowances, if any, would be immaterial.

Single-Employer Defined Benefit Pension Plan

Plan Description

Upon the retirement of eligible Teachers, the District will provide a total benefit of \$90,000, which will be contributed in equal payments over a 60-month period into a 403(b) on behalf of the retiree. Similarly, fulltime, full year Support Staff that were hired prior to January 1, 2005 may also receive a 403(b) benefit of \$35,000 upon their retirement that will be paid out over a 36-month period. The District will also make 403(b) contributions on behalf of the District Administrator in the amount of \$9,000 for a period of 5 years. The Plan is administered by the District and does not issue a stand alone finanical report..

Budgetary Information

Budgetary information is derived from the annual operating budget and is presented using generally accepted accounting principals and the modified accrual basis of accounting. Budgets are adopted for all governmental funds.

Budgets are adopted at the function level in the General Fund and the fund level for all other funds. Appropriations lapse at year end unless specifically carried over.

Funding Progress Data

The data presented in the Schedule of Funding Progress was taken from the report issued by the actuary.

Wisconsin Retirement System (WRS) Pension

The amounts presented in relation to the schedule of employer's proportionate share of the net pension asset and the schedule of employer contributions represents the specific data of the District. The information was derived using a combination of the employer's contribution data along with data provided by the Wisconsin Retirement System in relation to the District as a whole.

Changes of benefit terms. There were no changes of benefit terms for any participating employer in WRS.

Changes of assumptions. There were no changes in the assumptions.

Single Employer Defined Benefit Pension Plan

The District is required to present the last ten years of data; however accounting standards allow the presentation of as many years as are available until ten fiscal years are presented.

Accumulation of assets. No assets have been accumulated in a trust that meets the criteria in paragraph 4 of GASB Statement No. 73.

Changes of benefit terms. There were no changes of benefit terms for any participating employer in plan.

Changes of assumptions. The mortality assumptions changed from using 2012 WRS report to using the 2018 report. The experience study changed from using 2012-2014 WRS experience to using 2015-2017 data.

To the School Board of Lake Country School District

We have audited, in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards* issued by the Comptroller General of the United States, the financial statements of the governmental activities, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information of the Lake Country School District (District) as of and for the year ended June 30, 2021, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise the Lake Country School District's basic financial statements and have issued our report thereon dated December 2, 2021.

Internal Control Over Financial Reporting

In planning and performing our audit of the financial statements, we considered Lake Country School District's internal control over financial reporting (internal control) to determine the audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances for the purpose of expressing our opinions on the financial statements, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of Lake Country School District's internal control. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of the Lake Country School District's internal control.

A *deficiency in internal control* exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent, or detect and correct, misstatements on a timely basis. A *material weakness* is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control such that there is a reasonable possibility that a material misstatement of the entity's financial statements will not be prevented, or detected and corrected on a timely basis. Finding No. 2021-001 - Segregation of Duties Criteria -	Management is responsible for establishing and maintaining effective internal control over financial reporting, the selection and application of accounting principles and the safeguarding of assets. Proper segregation of duties provides a system of checks and balances on the accounting system and reduces the risk of errors and irregularities, both intentional and unintentional.
Condition -	The size of the District's office staff precludes an adequate segregation of accounting and reporting functions necessary to ensure an adequate internal control system. The District primarily operates its accounting and reporting functions with one individual.
Cause -	The District has not assigned duties to have appropriate controls in place.
Effect -	Errors or irregularities could occur and go unnoticed for an extended time.
Recommendation -	Continued monitoring and supervision of the accounting and reporting functions by management and the elected body. Monthly reporting of actual results, both revenues and expenditures, to budget.
District Response and Corrective Action Plan -	Although management does not prepare the financial statements, draft copies of the report is reviewed and approved prior to its issuance by management. This review includes verifying amounts to the general ledger and other documentation such as grant agreements, debt documents, etc. Management does attend annual training sessions which include content relating to current financial reporting requirements and new accounting standards. Currently, management has not implemented controls to evaluate and determine whether the financial statements conform to the requirements of accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. As such, management will continue to rely on the auditors to assist in preparing the District's financial statements.
Finding No. 2021-002 - Financial Reporting Criteria -	Statement on Auditing Standards AU - C 265 requires the communication to the Board of significant deficiencies and material weaknesses in the year end financial reporting process.
Condition -	The District's personnel do not have the necessary technical expertise in governmental accounting and reporting to prepare the District's financial statements in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles. The District has contracted with its auditing firm to perform this service.
Cause -	The District has chosen to have the auditors prepare the financial statements.
Effect -	Information provided to management throughout the year may not be presented in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles.
Recommendation -	Management should determine if the benefits achieved by resolving this internal control deficiency warrants the additional cost that would be required to remedy the current condition.
District Response and Corrective Action Plan -	Although some segregation of duties issues exist due to the limited number of

Section III: State Programs with Required Procedures Compliance Findings

Finding No. 2021-003 - Special Education

Criteria -

According to the guidance provided in the State of Wisconsin Statutes section 115.88, "staff must be appropriately licensed for a special education work assignment listed in

state statute in order for their salary and benefits to be eligible for aid".

Condition - During our testing for valid special education licensure, we noted one out of nineteen

individuals who did not have a proper license. Salary and benefits totaled \$6,511 for

this individual.

Accordingly, the information noted above was communicated to DPI on the No Valid License / Questioned Cost Worksheet for ultimate resolution between the District and

DPI. The sample was not statistically valid.

Cause - Factors that would cause a staff to be listed on the NVL report include; there was a

delay in receiving notification of licensing requirements; due to COVID the district and DPI were not aware of NVL issue occurring for this individual; and there may have

been an issue with individual failing to respond to DPI requests.

Questioned Costs - Could not be determined.

Effect - Salary and benefit amounts for the individuals with a licensure mismatch may have

been improperly reported in Project 011 and if so, improperly included in the aid

calculation.

Recommendation - We recommend management review and revise as necessary, existing processes and

procedures to monitor the licensing status of special education teachers to ensure that

they are appropriately licensed.

District Response and Corrective Action Plan - The district immediately removed the employee from Special Education duties upon

discovering failure to acquire licensure. Moving forward the district will ensure staff is

properly licensed prior to making new hires.
